# STRATEGIC PLAN 2022-2025

As we reach the end of our 2022-2025 Strategic Plan, we reflect on the incredible work of our staff towards achieving our strategic priorities. Some of the many achievements of the past three years have included:

## Integrate Client Voice Throughout Woodview





- Our engagement network has grown to 31 members, reflecting a diverse range of individuals dedicated to shaping Woodview's programs, services, and events through partnership, collaboration and co-creation.
- Brantford community agencies partnered to co-develop the Extensive Needs Program. This specialized support program is designed to provide clinical services to children and youth and their families, addressing an identified gap in our community.
- Woodview is proud to have been named a finalist for the *Best Nonprofit Employer - Youth Advancement* category at the 2024 Charity Village Conference & Awards. This honour celebrates Woodview's work in helping youth build confidence, learn skills, and make meaningful connections.

## Enhance Financial Health

- Woodview was fortunate over the past three years to receive several one-time funding opportunities that allowed us to make capital improvements, build program capacity, deliver additional services, and provide necessary staff training.
- We are incredibly grateful to our donors and grant funders who transform hope into action. Every donation brings us closer to empowering those in need with programs and services that inspire hope and strengthen lives!

## Develop and Adapt New, Agile Ways of Doing Business

- Woodview has embraced new and agile ways of doing business by leveraging technology, training all staff on agile principles, and initiating agency-wide continuous improvement projects. Over the past three years, our staff have made incredible strides in embedding agile in all aspects of our work.

- 100%** of managers trained in agile and lean principles
- 20** staff certified in Lean Six Sigma
- 13** continuous improvement projects initiated agency-wide, leading to:

- We continue to prioritize continuous quality improvement with a dedicated working group focused on advancing data and reporting, client and family satisfaction, program evaluation, risk management, and information technology.

## Strengthen Equity, Diversity & Inclusion

- Woodview has partnered with the Brantford Brant Norfolk Ontario Health Team to advance Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging through the development of e-learning modules, a maturity grid, and investing in resources to build capacity. This collaborative approach strengthens culturally safe, inclusive care, and creates a common language that unites all areas and celebrates our rich diversity.
- We continue to prioritize and strengthen equity, diversity, inclusion, and belonging. In 2025, 95% of caregivers surveyed agreed or strongly agreed staff were sensitive to their loved one's cultural needs including religion, language, ethnic background, and / or race.

## Promote a Positive Work Environment

- As an opportunity to celebrate our staff, our Board of Directors created a new Board Kudos Program. Each month, Board members recognize staff nominated by their peers. This small token of appreciation is just another way we're celebrating the heart and hard work that make Woodview such a special place to work. To date, the Board has celebrated over 20 staff for their incredible efforts!
- Our Leading Woodview Together (LWT) program returned in 2024. This 8-week leadership interactive workshop series is facilitated by Woodview's very own Executive Director, Flora Ennis. To date, over 70 staff have participated in LWT, inspiring staff to unlock the leader inside each of them.

# CELEBRATING 65 YEARS

## Our Roots in Hamilton

Woodview's roots date back to 1853 when the Sisters of St. Joseph started orphanages for boys and girls housed in the City of Hamilton. In 1936, a new care facility for boys and girls called Mount St. Joseph was built.

In 1960, the Mount St. Joseph Charter was signed and a new Corporation was formed. Specialized services delivered by individuals trained in social work, child and youth care, and psychology were developed. This represented the start of new methodologies in residential and day treatment services.

## The Early Days

In 1975, Canada House, a community-based residential program opened in Hamilton.

In 1978, Mount St. Joseph relocated to Burlington and was renamed Woodview Children's Centre. Day treatment programs and a residence were added at this new location. This marked the end of the era of the Sister's of St. Joseph's involvement.

Throughout the 1980s, Woodview continued to expand to meet the needs of our communities, opening residential and day treatment programs in Brantford, and establishing new day treatment programs in Hamilton.

# OUR HISTORY

## Responding to Community Needs



*Construction of the “Manor” in Hamilton*

In 1993, construction began on Woodview Manor, a townhouse complex housing a skill-teaching residential unit and semi-independent living program for adults with autism. The Manor was established in collaboration with Kiwanis Homes, a longstanding partnership that continues today!

In recognition of changing community needs and emerging research, Woodview closed its three residential treatment programs in the early 2000s. Instead, Woodview continued to focus its attention on building its community and office-based mental health programs that enabled children and youth to remain with their families while receiving services.

## Expanding to Children’s Autism Services

The 1990s and 2000s were transitional periods for Woodview, with the quick expansion of our programs and service offerings.



In 2002, Woodview expanded its Halton services, establishing the Woodview Learning Centre, a tuition-based elementary school for children with autism. In 2007, in an effort to meet the rise in services needed for children with autism, Woodview partnered with ErinoakKids to become a provider of Intensive Behavioural Intervention and Applied Behavioural Analysis - now known as the Ontario Autism Program.

## Becoming Woodview Mental Health and Autism Services

In 2010, Woodview celebrated its grand opening of 643 Park Road North – home of our Brantford child and youth mental health services, and now our Brantford Autism Services program.

In 2015, Woodview became the Lead Agency for Child and Youth Mental Health for the service area Brant-Brantford, and was officially renamed Woodview Mental Health and Autism Services as we are known today!

As we have continued to grow throughout the 2010s and early 2020s, we have expanded to sites we now know as Harmony Square, Woodview North, and our newest location at Halton Children’s Aid Society.

Today, Woodview operates over 30 programs across the communities of Brantford, Halton, and Hamilton, offering services and supports for children and youth facing mental health challenges and for individuals of all ages with Autism Spectrum Disorder, developmental disabilities, and / or other neurodivergencies.

# YOUTH ENGAGEMENT: A YEAR IN HIGHLIGHTS

## Fortitude Youth Initiative (Brantford)

Fortitude Youth Initiative (FYI) led an incredibly successful year of community connection!

In March 2024, FYI attended the City of Brantford's Inclusive Community Plan Summit, where two youth appeared in filmed interviews and one youth gave an impromptu speech on community advocacy and leadership. FYI also launched their fundraising campaign, "Hand in hand, we can be the change," selling pairs of custom-made bracelets with the intention of keeping one and giving one away to connect community members to one another.

The youth worked tirelessly over the spring months to create and bring to life the Talent Not Required show in May. Youth worked as emcees, sound managers, event staff, and organizers. The big night was a huge success, and was so well-attended that it outgrew our space, inspiring the youth to seek out a community partnership and external venue for next year!

In September 2024, four FYI youth and two adult allies took off to the woods of Mono, Ontario for Disable the Label - an annual leadership retreat that connects youth advocates from across the province through The New Mentality's network. The youth formed new connections, pushed themselves out of their comfort zones, and learned new things about leadership, community, and themselves.

Upon returning home, FYI began working on a new type of recruitment event - Parking Lot Chalk and Talk. It was important to the youth to create a space where community members and fellow youth could come and connect over a shared activity - and shared snacks! Lots of new and friendly faces stopped by, with FYI welcoming in two new members for the year.

Finally, to align with their desire to contribute more to the community, FYI launched a donation drive called the W.A.R.M.: Winter Accessory Roundup Months. This drive focused on a different winter accessory each month, with donations going to a local family shelter.

FYI's priorities continue to be connection-building and community presence, and through their continued work together with one another and the greater community, we can't wait to see what they do next!



# YOUTH ENGAGEMENT: A YEAR IN HIGHLIGHTS

## Youth Force (Halton)

Youth Force had another successful year promoting youth engagement, community partnership, and working towards dispelling the stigmas of mental health.

This past year, Youth Force focused on increasing their visibility in the community and promoting their great work. The group engaged in volunteer work with the Halton Children's Aid Society, and planned and implemented their inaugural youth art show at Burlington Mall's community Hub space. Youth Force looks forward to sending two representatives to the Disable the Label youth conference in the summer of 2025.

Youth Force also focused this year on developing leadership skills. The Art Avenue art show was an excellent opportunity for the youth to learn how to take on the responsibility of being a leader. Not only did this opportunity provide teachable moments, but offered practical experience in what it means to lead. Each member of the group were taught the necessary skills, and some of the group members were given leadership roles with individual responsibilities. This was an amazing experience, and the group members rose to the occasion, going beyond their own personal comfort zone.



The group of individuals that participated in youth engagement this year have displayed commitment to giving back to the community, selflessly giving their time to this endeavor and providing support to each other in times of struggle. It is truly inspiring to witness the personal growth of each of the group members.

Youth Force continues to focus on youth engagement, advocacy, and connection in 2025. They will continue to meet the mandate of dispelling the stigmas of mental health in our community, continue to propose fundraising initiatives, and seek out opportunities to share their message in their community. Group members have already started to plan their second annual Art Avenue art show!




